

Two Metro Atlanta Churches Expand to Provide More Services in the Kingdom

The notion that change is good certainly holds true for two metro Atlanta churches. Powerhouse of Deliverance Cathedral (Bishop M. J. Pace) and Enon Church and Ministries (Pastor Gregory L. Pollard) are all experiencing the benefits of renovation or building projects within their congregations. They have the common goal of creating an atmosphere that will help better serve the people of God.

Powerhouse of Deliverance Cathedral is in the midst of a fundraising project. Their goal is to raise \$300,000 by August 2004 for the purpose of building a structure on the land that they are currently purchasing, which is located off of Interstate 75 in Atlanta. The first phase of the Family Life Center, which will house administrative offices, is expected to be in place by September.

In an effort to keep up current and future church growth, Enon Church and Ministries moved to its new worship center in May 2004. The new worship center sits on 26 acres of land located at 3550 Enon Road in College Park, across from its current site. The new facility includes an 800-seat sanctuary, with expandable capability of an additional 300 seats when the balcony is installed. The new facility provides more than adequate classroom space to facilitate the many ministries and church school. The facility includes a fellowship hall, administrative offices, nursery and meeting rooms.

Plans are underway for the second phase of the building project, which will include a gymnasium and Enon's Multipurpose Community and Family Development Center. The center will facilitate senior citizen activities throughout the week with the long-range goal of housing for the elderly in order

that they might live out their years on holy ground--ground in which they've played an intricate part in constructing. Also to be included is senior citizen housing with government-assisted programs that will allow the senior citizens to live out their years in luxury, style, class and dignity. The Multi-purpose Community and Family Development Center will also host activities for the young people in order to impact the community as the church of yesterday.

Billy Gaitor:


Building a Legacy in Construction

It is probably safe to say that designing and building has been in Billy Gaitor's blood from the moment he was born, part of his lineage, if you will, seeing that both his father and grandfather were interior and exterior designers. Gaitor took this familial skill in a new direction and certainly on to a new plateau when he opened Gaitor Trucking and Excavating in 1965 in East St. Louis, Ill, a state known for its very blatant racial discrimination, even among its unions.

However, Gaitor broke new ground in this hostile environment and even became the founding father of the Southern Illinois Black Truckers Association. This stance and act is testament to Gaitor's resolute will and determination, which has served him well over the years as a sound businessman.

The success of his trucking and excavating company propelled Billy to





expand his business and go into construction as a general contractor. In 1995, after relocating to Atlanta, Billy Gaitor opened Gaitor Construction, Inc., located in the Fulton industrial area. Since then, Gaitor has experienced steady success in the big city of the south. He modestly states that indeed, "Atlanta has been good for the business." Right now, Gaitor Construction is enjoying a highly touted client list, including two large government entities: the city of Atlanta and Fulton County.

Steady contracts keep Gaitor's staff of 18 permanent employees pretty busy most of the year, but construction can be very fickle and unpredictable, which usually dictates the hiring of temporary employees based on the company's immediate needs. As general contractors, Gaitor Construction, is involved in every phase of construction from demolitions to the building of many types of structures from residential to commercial, as well as schools and athletic stadiums.

The world of a general contractor involves a well-engineered process from beginning to end. Typically, once a bid on a contract is awarded, Gaitor Construction would then begin the next phase of the construction process. If it is a residential community, the land is first cleared and grazed to its prop-

er specifications. Then the utilities are installed on the land. The next step would be to start building, which must be followed to the exact points of the blueprints. "We do the entire construction process from inception to completion," says Gaitor. Gaitor credits his paternal ancestral line for whetting his appetite for the field of construction. "It began with my grandfather and my father, who were interior and exterior decorators, and I had no choice," Gaitor concedes in a mock deflated tone. He continues, "I went into a whole other area [of designing]." This move has proved to be the right path for Gaitor. As the company continued to evolve and develop, it received major accolades including one prestigious award from the State of Florida. In 1998, Gaitor Construction, Inc., was honored with The Martin Luther King Humanitarian Award, which was based upon their impeccable work with the school system in Miami.

As Gaitor ponders the next 10 years of his life as it relates to his business, he does not see himself in the same capacity as he is today.

He hopes that by that time, he has retired and has put his company in the competent hands of someone else. Gaitor does not hesitate to point out who that person might be... George Legra. Legra, an engineer who also serves as Gaitor's vice president, and has been with the company since 1980.

Legra's dedication is evident when he fills with enthusiasm as he talks about the future of Gaitor Construction. It is easy to see Legra's commitment to making Gaitor Construction a top-notch company as he shares his vision. "We are contenders," he utters with unwavering conviction. Legra adds, "We look forward to leveraging our position based on our ability to perform the work."

Gaitor says he is thrilled about his membership with the BRC. "I hope to be a good member and to contribute to the BRC in any capacity," says Gaitor. Home Improvement

Atlanta is a hot market for new home construction. According to the National Association of Home Builders, Metro Atlanta was ranked the number one city in the nation for single-family housing permits in 2003.

With the country experiencing a housing boom and the home remodeling market topping off at \$169 billion, it seems every other person is either purchasing a home or is in some stage of renovating their current home. Because a home is often an individual's largest investment, a homeowner should enlist qualified homebuilding/home improvement professionals at every turn. One such professional is a home inspector, who can advise on what improvements to make in order to make a house sellable, as well as determine whether a home is in proper condition for renovation.

"When buying or selling a house, it's a good idea to get it inspected because you never know what's hidden behind the walls of the house," says Anthony Oliver, owner of A&A Home and Stucco Inspection. Oliver is a state-licensed and certified home inspector and member of the American Society of Home Inspectors. When he inspects a home, Oliver examines the entire home from the roof to the foundation. "As for the roof, I want to make sure it's not sagging or leaking, that the tiles are in good shape and that there's overall good craftsmanship." He checks the foundation to make sure it is sound, with no moisture problems or cracks. Interior inspections involve a thorough examination of the home's electrical and plumbing systems.

A home inspector also examines the finer points of a house, like its overall design, layout and landscaping to try to determine what really enhances the house's character. "We don't just look for negative things," explains Oliver.

For the homeowner who wants to add a room, repave a driveway or refurbish a deck, a general contractor is typically the best way to go. Southwest Atlanta-based Beeks Service Company serves as a general contractor on all types of small and large residential renovation projects.

According to Clifton Beeks, one of the first things a homeowner should do when preparing for a home renovation project is to set a budget and establish priorities. When selecting a contractor, the homeowner needs to make sure the contractor has liability insurance. "If they don't have insurance, then the homeowner is responsible for what happens on the job site," says Beeks, who has been a general contractor since 1998. "Next, get several bids on the project and compare apples to apples and oranges to oranges. A homeowner should be specific about what he or she wants and remember that the cheapest price is not always the best price."

The same applies when undertaking a kitchen remodel. To help its customers understand the process involved in creating custom furniture, such as kitchen cabinetry, J&S Custom Trim & Cabinetry takes them through each step so they can view and approve the creation of their product from start to finish. In addition to kitchen cabinetry, J&S Custom Trim & Cabinetry also crafts wall units, tables and other wooden furniture pieces at its Suwanee workshop. John Pettway, artist and owner of J&S, recommends his clients review plenty of magazines and books to get an idea of their style preference for a particular piece of furniture. Adds Pettway, "When that's done our goal is to help make it a reality by producing what they want."



Shavonda Williams' enthusiasm is infectious. And as a motivational speaker, that works to her advantage.



Zion Hill Development Corp.

There are countless community organizations both local and national that help women reconstruct their lives in various capacities. However, few organizations seek to help women change their lives in every facet of their life. This is exactly the mission of the Zion Hill Community Development Corporation (CDC) in East Point. Under the leadership of its executive director, Rev. Melanie Conner, program manager, Janvieve Williams Comrie, and an army of volunteers, Zion Hill CDC is not only offering hope, but they are giving homeless and displaced women a road map to a better life.

For those women seeking to make a change from a holistic approach, this center seems to be a sanctuary armed with the notion that real change is comprehensive; it involves every facet of one's being. Zion Hill CDC, which opened its doors in 2002, is the vision and extension of the outreach endeavors of Zion Hill Baptist Church on Lynhurst Drive. "Every ministry in the church does some sort of outreach," says Rev. Conner. Zion Hill Baptist Church decided to take their outreach efforts a step further by opening the Zion Hill CDC. Many members of Zion Hill Baptist volunteer their time and services to the CDC.

A faith-based, non-profit, charitable organization, Zion Hill CDC operates out of a renovated 2,000-square-foot home/center in East Point. Administrative

offices, a resource library, conference rooms and a computer lab are all housed at the Zion Hill CDC. The women and children, however, do not live there. Right next door to the center is another facility that will serve as an expansion of the CDC. The already purchased property will undergo renovations and open in 2005 for additional usage, such as meeting rooms and the like. Rev. Conner's eyes dance with excitement when she utters the new space is 4,000 square feet, twice the size of their current home.

The Zion Hill CDC works primarily with homeless and/or at-risk women with children. Through well-structured program the women begin the arduous road to a new start so that they can ultimately lead self-sufficient lives. Their two main programs help to address the women's diverse needs. The programs are New Beginnings and Bridge of Hope. As Rev. Conner, who is an ordained minister, explains the programs, she is brimming with enthusiasm. To her, Zion Hill CDC was a blessing in disguise. She, in fact, resigned from a lucrative post with a major corporation to take the position with the CDC, which she says with resolute zeal - she has no regrets.

New Beginnings is a phenomenal program designed to expose the women to an array of life skills. They offer workshops on career counseling, nutrition, parenting classes, education and financial aid, to name a few. There is also a weekly bible study session that is strongly encouraged by the staff. Many of the women that come to the center are referred by the Department of Family & Children Services. In addition to attending the workshops, the women also get on the job experience right there at the center doing administrative, clerical and cleaning tasks.

The CDC also partners with other organizations, such as the Women's Employment Opportunity Project (WEOP), where the women can get training and information on starting their own business, if that is something they would like to one day pursue. "If you want more and you're willing to work for it, then let us help you get to where you want to be. You may have to work at McDonald's today, but you don't have to stay

there forever," Rev. Conner warmly conveys.

"We try to do a variety of things. We offer exercise classes and things like that because we're trying to present a holistic approach to helping people," explains Rev. Conner. The center has even invited lawyers to come and talk to the women about legal issues, such as wills and life insurance. These subjects often evade many people, especially the disenfranchised.

The Bridge of Hope program is a national initiative that will launch in Atlanta through Zion Hill CDC. It is an innovative mentoring program. What makes this mentoring relationship different is that it gives each woman a group of eight to 10 mentors to interact and work with on different issues. "I got excited about it because I know I wouldn't be where I am if I didn't have people in my life who told me to 'no, yes, don't do this. Even though it was my family, not everyone has that luxury," Rev. Conner reveals. "Each of the mentors will have an area they will focus on, but they will all work together," Rev. Conner explains.

Men can also serve as mentors, which, according to Rev. Conner, is a welcomed change in many of the women's lives. "The beauty of having males in the mentor groups is that they can show them that a man can care about them without wanting something from them," says Rev. Conner. All mentors go through training and once a month the mentors will gather with their mentee for a family night.

Zion Hill CDC is an incredible community outreach program aiding homeless and at-risk women and their children. Considering that the center has been open for less than two years, it will be amazing to see what heights they reach in the years to come and the many lives they change for the better. When thinking about the future of the Zion Hill CDC, program manager, Janvieve Williams Comrie, sums it up best, "I would like to see not only the change in the women, but the evolution of the women, breaking the cycles that they might be apart of and becoming really empowered."

While growing up on the island of Jamaica, Linda learned the fine and highly sought skill of tailoring and dressmaking. She continued to develop this craft after moving to Atlanta, during the 1970s. Linda did tailoring and alterations on the side while she maintained a full-time job. She longed to work in the field on a full-time basis and to eventually open her own designing business. In the 1980s, Linda finally started her business in Lithonia. Linda and George moved to Fort Lauderdale, for a stint, and after a few years they returned to Atlanta.

By 1999, Linda was able to open her shop, TK Designs, in honor of her mother who taught her how to sew. As Linda handles the designing, tailoring and alterations, George handles the sales, marketing and public-relations end of the business. George develops good business relationships with other businesses in the clothing design and wedding industry. The Sears also employ three seamstresses, who work part-time and

full-time during the busier seasons.

Linda says she prefers to have about five or six months to design and create a bridal dress. She says the least amount of time she is willing to work with is two months depending on the availability of fabric. "That gives the bride a chance to make several changes," says Linda. George emphasizes initial consultations. He says, "Getting them through the door is very important. We really want to get them in here."

Spread out throughout TK Designs are plenty of dresses, both bridal and formal, adorning the walls and filling up every inch of space of their shop like works of art, which in many ways it is, at least for Linda. "This

is exciting. I get to work with different fabrics. I get to see how the garments are put together," Linda describes with subtle enthusiasm. Linda adds, "Someone can fax me a rough sketch and I can work from that." In addition to the actual clothing on hand, there are plenty of books displaying their designs as well as other bridal fashion magazines for perusal.

The Sears believe that the most effective marketing tool they have is their reputation. It is through referrals that they receive the bulk of their clients, which speaks volumes about the quality of work they put out. Linda recalls a customer that came to her on a Monday after attending a wedding that Linda designed the bride's dress for that past Saturday. The Sears even have clients coming from neighboring states, like South Carolina and Florida, to name a few.

In addition to bridal dresses, bridal party dresses and tuxedos, TK Designs also makes custom-made formal wear, as well as "dressy" casual wear. They even design luxurious robes and they do embroidery on towels, as well as clothes. As George warmly quips, "We do everything!"

Atlanta Welcomes "The History Makers" Intimate Interview with Renowned Della Reese Marks Launch of Southeast Region

The adage, "You can't know your destiny without knowing your history," could very well be the motto for The History Makers. A Chicago-based, nonprofit, 501c3 organization that enlightens, entertains and educates the public in an effort to refashion a more inclusive record of American history, The HistoryMakers is in a class all by itself. Only once in the history of the United States has there been a massive attempt to record the African American experience as told in first person, and that was with the WPA Slave Narratives, resulting in the recording of 2300 former slaves between the years of 1936 and 1938. The organization is the brainchild of Julianna Richardson, and its mission is to capture America's history one person at a time, creating a priceless video collection and giving those involved their special place in history to educate the world about the struggles, determination and achievements of the African American experience.

On Friday, June 18, 2004, The HistoryMakers launched its Atlanta/Southeast Region with the interviewing of the legendary Della Reese. The event marked the first of 200 recording interviews (time permitting) in the Region. The Della Reese interview was conducted by actress Lorraine Toussaint of the Lifetime Television drama "Any Day Now," and was filmed live at Georgia Public Broadcasting's Studio C. The Honorary Co-Chairs for the evening were Walter and Shirley Massey (Morehouse College), Ingrid Saunders Jones (The Coca-Cola Company), and Richard O. Groves (Hilton Atlanta). The Co-Chairs were Brooke Jackson Edmond and Rod Jackson (Jackmont Hospitality and Edmond and Jones, PC, respectively.) Sponsors included Sodexo, Hilton Atlanta, The Coca-Cola Company, UPS, McDonalds, Georgia Public Broadcasting, WSB-TV, America's Favorite Chicken, Bank of America, Jackmont Hospitality, Thrifty Car Rental and H. J. Russell & Co. An elegant reception was held prior to the taping, and entertainment was provided by Faye Raye and Friends.

Witnessing an intimate interview with Della Reese could be compared to enjoying an evening with a family elder while sitting on the front porch on a cool summer night. Della Reese is full of wisdom and wit, and she candidly shared some of her life's most cherished moments. The tone for the evening was set by the presentation of video clips of a young, singing Della. Captions of her life were shown throughout the evening. Lorraine Toussaint did a phenomenal job as she verbally chronicled the life of one of America's most sensational living legends.

Born in Detroit in 1931 as Deloreese Patricia Early, Della Reese sprang from humble beginnings. Her father worked as a steel worker for 37 years. "The year after he retired, they made a machine; they said that kind of work was not meant for a human being." Her mother scrubbed floors, cleaned houses and sewed. "We didn't know we were poor," Ms. Reese reflects, "because we had just as much as everyone around us."

As a child, she overcame rheumatic fever, despite the fact that she was sent home from the hospital to die. "I was three then, now I'm almost 73." She attributed her survival to her mom's use of home remedies of cold packs. As she continued to grow, Della proved to be a talented child. She began singing at age six, and by the time she was 13 years old, she had gotten the attention of the famous gospel singer, Mahalia Jackson. "I was so happy when my mother allowed me to go with her because I thought I was going to have a chance to act as most kids my age would when away from their parents. I thought, 'This is heaven. I'm going to help this old lady out!'" But her expectations yielded great disappointment. Mahalia guarded young Della very carefully, just as Della's mom expected her to. "Everybody would get to go to the restaurants and eat. Not me. They'd bring my food back to the hotel," she quipped.

Her travels with Mahalia spanned ten years of summer breaks. At age 16, she became the first in her family to finish high school. Due to changes in her family, she found herself working a number of jobs to help her family. They included secretary, dental assistant, taxi cab driver and even truck driver. After some time, her professional scenario shifted from gospel to secular, wherein she worked in clubs and show bars. "What happened," asked Toussaint. Della replied in a matter-of-fact tone, "I got hungry," and explained how people didn't have a lot of money to go see gospel. "There were five of us, and we'd be blessed if we had gas to get home. I'd take a job after every tour."

Della's career did progress, and she eventually received her big break when Lee Maggett helped her get signed with Jubilee Records. Her recording career took off in the 1950s, and she appeared on the Ed Sullivan show more than 20 times. But it wasn't long before she lost her father. On top of that, she found herself becoming a mother to one of her brother's children as a result of there being too many children for the family to afford to feed. She told her sister-in-law, "If you have the baby, I'll be there for you." She (her sister in law) kept the baby for 2 1/2 years, and things got worse. "One night as I was about to perform, the baby was left in the dressing room. When I returned from performing, she was still there. She called me 'Mama' from that time on." Her daughter transitioned two years ago, but she left her spirit in her son, who is now a Morehouse man.

As the interview progressed, Della shared many other nuggets from her life. On the success of the series, "Touched by an Angel," she responded, "People need to know about God. We've tried everything else---money, sex, greed---and nothing worked. It's time to go back to basics." Today, she is an ordained minister, and she pastors the Understanding Principles for Better Living Church. She shares that she never intended to be a preacher, and how bringing comfort to people in their time of spiritual need brought fulfillment to her.

She reflected on her experiences with co-laborers Redd Foxx and Freddie Prince. Perhaps one of the greatest highlights of her life is her husband, Franklin Lett. Together for 25 years, she informed that he is, "absolutely my everything. We've been together 25 years, and I don't have anything to complain about."

When asked how she'd like to be remembered, she stated simply, "I would just like to be remembered." Then she reflected that she's been blessed to touch more than one generation. One generation may remember her as a singer; another as the first African American female to host her own talk show; another as an actress. With a life well lived that has caused many to feel as if they really have been touched by an angel, Della Reese has earned a place not only in history but in the hearts of many.
